REGULATIONS.

Lending.—Every shareholder of or subscriber to the New York Society Library, shall be allowed to take out *four* works at a time, of which not more than one shall be a new work.

New books may be kept one week only. Other books may be kept three weeks, with the privilege of renewal, unless other members have applied for them.

Books recently purchased or for any reason in demand will be considered as new books.

FINES—One cent per volume must be paid for each day they are retained over the time allowed. Loss or damage of books must be paid for; if a part of a set, the value of the entire set must be paid for.

No member can lend any book belonging to the Library.

ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Trustees of the New York Society Library

The Trustees of the New York Society Library respectfully submit to the shareholders, the following statement of its condition for the year ending March 31st, 1899.

The report of the Treasurer, presented herewith, shows the receipts from all sources during the year, to have amounted to \$12,170.95, and the disbursements of all kinds to \$11,057.80, leaving a balance on hand of \$1,113.15, of which amount the sum of \$466.41 belongs to the income of the Green Fund, and \$646.74 to the General Fund.

The sum of \$2,000, received from the commutation of annual dues has been invested in bond and mortgage on the premises at No. 39 South William Street, in addition to \$8,000 mentioned in the last Annual Report. There is still due, however, the sum of \$1,800 to the commutation fund from the general income, for temporary loans; and the bills to be paid, for insurance, water, and ordinary expenses in April, will more than absorb the balance now in bank.

The balance remaining of the commutation fund is \$35.46. Nine shares or rights have been made free from dues by commutation during the year, and three surrendered, so that the amount received, during the year now past, for annual dues is considerably smaller than during the preceding year.

No pains have been spared to make the collection of annual dues as thorough as possible, and there remain but two or three whose dues are unpaid because they cannot be reached or found.

The total number of visitors to the Library during the year was 15,462, of whom over two-thirds were ladies. The total circulation amounted to 33,925, of which 26,306 were works of fiction.

The circulation for this year is considerably larger than any previously recorded.

The new card catalogue has proved itself an indispensable convenience to the Library, and a noble monument to the munificence of the donor, Mr. F. Augustus Schermerhorn.

Nearly all the books which circulate have been entered by author, title and subject, and in a short time all the newspapers, periodicals, Government documents, etc., will be entered.

In order to draw books from the Library it is not necessary to visit the building; a postal card will always insure the delivery of any books in a short time. During the year our messenger carried 6,012 books, visiting 1,145 residences or offices, between the Battery and 132d Street. This service costs the member simply the messenger's car fare. If desired, books are sent by mail or express to members.

An opportunity having occurred for the purchase of a new site, a Committee was appointed to consider the matter. For various reasons, the purchase did not seem feasible. Having fulfilled the duty to the best of its ability, the Committee was discharged at its own request.

The Library needs a large sum of money for re-binding newspapers and periodicals. It would probably cost over \$1,000 to put all our old sets in proper condition to prevent possibility of injury.

The shelves are over-crowded and additional shelf room to accommodate the books already in our possession, is needed.

Another alcove should be fitted up for the John C. Green collection, and various improvements could be made throughout the building, if adequate funds were at hand.
